Howdy and Happy Holidays!

As the sun sets on our yearlong Centennial Celebration, I reflect on the various events we've held. In July, we gathered for a family picnic at Camp Geronimo and managed to have a day of outdoor adventure before the rains moved in. In November, we enjoyed a Centennial Cub Scout Pow Wow hosted by our Wipala Wiki Order of the Arrow Lodge. And, just a few weeks ago we enjoyed our first NESA event in several years and hosted our first "Holiday at the Heard." Throughout the year many Scouts across our council worked on earning the "GCC Centennial Award", and I've seen many hanging from the pockets of our Scouts and leaders. A great year and a great milestone! It's amazing to think about Scouting over 100 years in this part of the world and all the change we've seen – Arizona was a very different place in 1921!

Our marketing project continues with good progress and good success. As you may have heard, LAVIDGE has provided three training courses (so far) for parents and unit and district Scouters (public relations, social media, and brand messaging); all three were recorded and are available for viewing on our website.

One of our takeaways from the project is that our Scouting 'lingo' often makes it difficult for new Scouts and their families to feel welcome. We're also learning that the first 30-60 days are critical for a new Scout and their family, and we're learning that we don't consistently do a good enough job on-boarding new Scout families.

To attack the first challenge (lingo), LAVIDGE is working on a new brand platform from which we'll develop new ways to talk about Scouting with prospective members. For example:

In Scouting, every new adventure, every campout, and every badge is a chance to learn new skills and gain new experiences. Scouts and their families are welcomed into an inclusive community that encourages them to try new hobbies, serve their community, and explore the outdoors while learning about the world around them. Through these experiences, Scouts gain knowledge and skills; create and strengthen relationships with family, friends, and communities; and learn to lead values-based lives that build their character and leadership abilities, setting them up for future success.

New Announcing the Grand Canyon Council Unit Marketing Awards in 2022

Positive publicity and marketing Scouting to youth and the community are important steps to rebuilding Scouting in Grand Canyon Council and Arizona. As a next step of our marketing emphasis, beginning in 2022 we will begin recognizing units for their marketing and publicity work. Alert for Units Headed to California

The State of California recently passed legislation strengthening requirements designed to keep youth safe from sexual abuse. California Law AB-506 requires, among other things, that adults working with youth must submit to background checks that include fingerprinting. It is our understanding at this time that any unit participating in a Scouting activity, even if they are not residents of California, will be required to conform to this law.

As this is a new law, we are still learning how it will be implemented and how it will impact Scouting leaders. Stay tuned for more but 'be prepared' if your unit is planning to go to California.



SCOUTING FOR FOOD 2022 IS COMING!

Due to COVID-19, about 1 in 5 Arizonans and 1 in 3 Arizona children were impacted by food insecurity. The annual Scouting for Food drive is an excellent way to help those individuals and families in a meaningful way. Scouting for Food is an opportunity for Scouts to fight hunger in our communities. Scouting for Food is the leading service program for Boy Scouts of America and is a part of the national BSA program – Good Turn for America.

In partnership with local food banks, this council-wide service project will beginning in January as Scouts distribute door hangers in their neighborhoods to announce the upcoming food drive. Days later, Scouts will return on the first Saturday of February to collect donations from doorsteps and deliver them to their local food banks and pantries.

We would love for each and every Scout in Arizona to lead by example and do their best to combat food insecurities. Our goal is to collect 12 pounds of food, approximately 15 cans, per Scout. This goal would allow Scouts to provide 150,000 pounds of food to those in need!

What Should New Scouts BSA Members work on?



The troop program should be setup so that new Scouts can earn First class within 12 to 18 months and Star rank soon after. A well-rounded and active unit program that generates advancement as a natural outcome should enable Scouts to achieve First Class in their first 12 to 18 months of membership. We have found that over time, Scouts stay active in the troop if they achieve these goals. Advancement is a straightforward matter but attention must be paid by the unit leaders to make sure these goals are achieved. Information on advancement in troops can be found in Section 4.2.0.0 of the Guide to Advancement. Advancement tracking tools, such as Scoutbook help units track every Scout's progress. Help on getting started in Scoutbook can be found here.

Remember to Sign Up as a Citizenship in Society Merit Badge Counselor



Scouts are to be signed off on merit badges by properly registered and approved merit badge counselors. Also, all Scouts who will complete the Eagle rank after July 1, 2022 must complete the Citizenship in So-

ciety merit badge. So, we will need many counselors available throughout the state. To be approved as a merit badge counselor for this badge, first make sure you are registered as a merit badge counselor. Learn how to register as merit badge counselor. The only other requirements to be a merit badge counselor for this badge are to take the <u>BSA DEI training</u> and to agree to follow the <u>Citizenship in Society Merit Badge</u> <u>Counselor Guide</u>.

THE LIFE TO EAGLE PROCESS

NESA Scholarships Available



Earning the Eagle Scout rank is an impressive achievement that provides lasting impacts on one's life. One of those impacts can be financial support for higher education.

Beginning December 1, the National Eagle Scout Association will be accepting applications for five annual scholarships of varying amounts. Applicants must have completed an Eagle Scout board of review before January 24, 2022; must be members of NESA (click here to join); and must submit their application through the NESA scholarship portal between December 1, 2021, and January 31, 2022. Full requirements and conditions are listed here.

Other eligibility requirements include:

- Eagle Scouts may apply for NESA scholarships beginning in their senior year of high school through their junior year in college.
- Recipients may receive a NESA scholarship one time only.
- NESA scholarships are available to Eagle Scouts attending four-year colleges or universities, vocational trade schools and other approved programs.
- NESA scholarships are not available to students attending any of the U.S. military academies.
- NESA scholarships are not available to graduate students pursuing a master's or doctoral degree.

Last year, 45 Eagle Scouts received a total of \$425,500 from NESA to aid in their educational endeavors. These scholarships are made possible by generous donors and NESA members that help the alumni organization.

Scouts First Helpline

1-844-726-8871 or 844-SCOUTS1

Do you know what this number is and what it is used for?

BSA has established 844-SCOUTS1 (844-726-8871), a dedicated 24-hour helpline to receive reports of known or suspected abuse or behavior that might put a youth at risk.

Who can use the helpline?

Scout leaders, registered members, parents, Scouting professionals, or anyone else who believes a youth in Scouting might be at risk.

When should I use the Scouts First Helpline?

Anytime you believe a youth has been harmed or their safety and well-being is at risk, and you cannot immediately reach your Scout executive or local council.

Below are some examples:

- A leader on a campout receives a report that one of the Scouts has been abused, and the council office is closed.
- Parents learn after their Scout has returned from camp that the youth was threatened with a knife, but they don't know who to call at the council.
- A Scouting professional receives an anonymous report of abuse and would like guidance on next steps.
- An individual is camped next to a Scout troop and witnesses behavior that appears to be unsafe.

Can I use the helpline during normal business hours?

Yes. The goal of the helpline is to provide immediate assistance that ensures the alleged victim as well as unit and council leadership are fully supported and appropriate actions are taken. During business hours, a member of the National Service Center will help you. Calls made after hours may be answered by an answering service that will take the information, determine the level of urgency, and then notify the appropriate person.

Reporting Tips

Accurate information is critical to an appropriate response. However, a lack of specific information is not a reason to delay a report. The Scouts First Helpline is not intended to take the place of council involvement. It is to provide 24/7 guidance to volunteers, Scouts, parents, and Scouting professionals to report abuse or serious youth protection violations outside of the local council's business hours. Local councils receiving reports of abuse or behavior that might put a youth at risk will contact Scouts First to report the incident.
