A reminder that the Scouter Code of Conduct and the BSA Rules & Regulations speak to BSA policies regarding political activity in Scouting:

Applicable section of the Scouter Code of Conduct:

I will respect and abide by the Rules and Regulations of the Boy Scouts of America, BSA policies, and BSA-provided training, including but not limited to those relating to:

- Unauthorized fundraising activities
- Advocacy on social and political issues, including prohibited use of the BSA uniform and brand
- Bullying, hazing, harassment, and unlawful discrimination of any kind

Applicable section of the BSA Rules & Regulations:

Policy Concerning Political Questions

The Boy Scouts of America must not, through its governing body or through any of its officers, chartered councils, Scouters, or members, involve Scouting in political matters. However, this must not be interpreted to prevent the teaching of ideals of patriotism and good citizenship as required to fulfill the Boy Scouts of America's purpose. Faith-based teachings incorporated into the Scouting program by religious chartered organizations in a manner consistent with the Bylaws are not considered political matters. This policy does not prohibit the Boy Scouts of America from expressing its opinion upon matters of governmental concern when considered in its best interest by the governing body of the Boy Scouts of America. This policy does not limit the freedom of thought or action of any Scouter or member as an individual in a manner not directly or indirectly implying a connection to Scouting.

The 2021 tax season may be over but it's never too early to plan for 2022!

What is the difference between a tax credit and a tax deduction? A tax credit is more beneficial to you on your taxes than a deduction. A tax credit reduces the amount you owe dollar-for-dollar. A tax deduction reduces the amount of income on which you are taxed and affects how much taxes you owe to the state but is not a dollar-for-dollar reduction.

Through the Arizona tax credit program which benefits organizations assisting low-income children, individuals and families, donors to the Grand Canyon Council can claim a personal tax credit for the amount of their contributions (up to \$400 for individuals and up to \$800 for couples filing jointly). Again, this reduces the amount you owe dollar for dollar! The Arizona tax credit is taken when you file your Arizona personal tax return, resulting in either less taxes owed or a larger refund. As an example, if you expect to pay \$500 on your 2022 Arizona income tax and you make a \$400 tax credit donation to GCC, next spring you will only have to pay \$100! By doing this, you are helping young people who live in challenging circumstances learn time-tested, proven skills and values that have been changing lives for over 100 years.

As always, you are encouraged to speak with a tax advisor as to what type of donation will be best for your financial circumstances.

Starting July 1 – Eagle Candidates Will Need Citizenship in Society Merit Badge

A reminder that starting July 1, 2022, those Life Scouts who do not have all requirements (except the Eagle Board of Review) signed off will need to also include the Citizenship in Society merit badge on their Eagle Application.

Eagle Scout candidates will continue to use the current rank requirements until June 30, 2022 and will not be required to complete the new Citizenship in Society Merit Badge as long as they complete all of the current Eagle Rank requirements before July 1, 2022. They do not have to submit their final Eagle Scout application nor complete their Eagle Scout Board of Review prior to July 1, 2022, but must complete all current Eagle Scout requirements before then.

So, starting July 1, 2022, Eagle Scout candidates will be required to complete all Eagle Scout requirements including the new Citizenship in Society merit badge. There will be a new Eagle Application issued in June that will have this merit badge on it. All Scouts who have not finished their Eagle requirements prior to July 1, 2022 must use this new application. Requirements for this badge are here:

Scoutmasters and other troop leaders are not authorized to sign off this new badge unless they are registered as a merit badge counselor and approved to counsel this badge. To be approved as a merit badge counselor for this badge, first make sure you are registered as a merit badge counselor. To find out how to register as a merit badge counselor, go to this page:

Scouts Can Earn BSA's Highest Honor for Conservation and Environmental Service

The BSA Distinguished Conservation Service Award encourages exemplary environmental stewardship and service.From the Boy Scouts of America's inception, Scouts have been taught the importance of conservation. In fact, Gifford Pinchot, director of the U.S. Forest Service and the BSA's first chief Scout forester, suggested conservation be added to the Scout Law. It didn't end up as part of the 12 points of the BSA's Scout Law, but the organization has since put forth many opportunities and programs to instill this value, including the BSA Distinguished Conservation Service Awards program.

NEW! Cub Scout Cyber Chip and Protect Yourself Rules

For Cub Scout ranks; Tiger, Wolf, Bear, Webelos, and Arrow of Light the Cyber Chip requirement may be replaced with earning the Protect Yourself Rules Adventure. Lions do not have a Cyber Chip requirement for rank. <u>Protect Yourself Rules Adventure</u>. If Cub Scouts use the Protect Yourself Rules Adventure in place of the Cyber hip requirement, the adventure cannot be used as an elective for rank. For more information see:

Veterans Memorial Cemetery Flag Placement Project May 28, 2022 Veterans Memorial Cemetery

On May 28, 7:00 AM a flag placement event is taking place at the Veterans Memorial Cemetery of Arizona located at 23029 N. Cave Creek Road. Scouters would meet at the center of the cemetery near the flagpole. You need to be in Class A uniform. "Parents and family members are welcome to help, please wear red, white and blue." There is a big need for as many Scouts as possible, they have a large area to cover. They suggest bringing a ½ inch cordless drill to help create the hole to place the flag in. Flags will be provided.

Our second event is scheduled for July 4th. It's our annual flag collection project and it will be held at the Royal Palm Park July 4 Celebration located at 8405 N. 15th Avenue. Several booths will be setup with games and fun things for kids to do. The parade around the neighborhood starts at 8:00 AM. We will have a booth setup for our collection effort, which makes us visible to the neighborhood for those who need to have a flag retired. Plan to attend the event where you will hear stories about "their flag" and what brought them there.

Over two days, the conservation efforts resulted in approximately 105 cubic yards of earth (enough dirt to cover a football field with about an inch of dirt) and 112 cubic feet of rock and gravel being moved to improve water flow at the camp. September 9-11 - October 8-9

Wood Badge is an exciting, action-packed program designed to provide all adult members of the Boy Scouts of America with leadership skills and experience they can use in their units, districts, and council.

Participants learn to:

- View Scouting globally as a family of inter-related value-based programs that provide age-appropriate activities for youth.
- Recognize the contemporary leadership concepts utilized in Corporate America and leading government organizations that are relevant to our value-based movement.
- Apply the skills learned from participation as a member of a successful working team.

To attend the course, individuals must:

- Be registered members of the Boy Scouts of America and age 18 or older.

 B, and C of the Annual Health and Medical Record form.

SAFETY CORNER

Reminder: In the Four Points of SAFE Scouting, the "F" is for Fitness. Please Check-in on Adult Leaders and Youth Participants to Remind Them of the Importance of Fitness.

As you encourage leaders and participants to follow the principles of <u>SAFE</u>, you can highlight the following:

Ensure ALL participants complete an <u>Annual Health and</u> <u>Medical Record.</u>

- Update the health history making note of any recent changes, especially if fitness routines were paused by COVID-19.
- Stress the importance of consulting with health care professionals to consider health risks including respiratory issues, excess body weight, history of heart or cardiovascular diseases, high blood pressure, diabetes, seizures, COVID-19, etc.
- Determine fitness levels and skills testing at the unit level before strenuous Scouting activities.

Reminder: Annual Health & Medical Record

Camping season is upon us! Be sure to encourage ALL participants to fully complete the <u>Annual Health & Medical</u> <u>Record (AHMR)</u> for ALL activities. To be sure to have the most current information, remember to link to the AHMR, and don't host your own version. Any questions? You can find the answers on the <u>AHMR landing page</u> or the <u>AHMR FAQ page</u>.

Basics:

- Parts A & B For all events/all participants less than 72 hours in duration.
- Parts A, B & C For events/resident camps lasting 72 hours or more.
- Risk Advisory Don't forget the Risk Advisory for each of the High Adventure Bases. This should be reviewed with your healthcare provider at the time of your pre-participation exam.
- Council Based High Adventure Program We've built this template for you to develop your own risk advisory for your council high adventure program to share with your campers.

Brother and Sister Achieve Eagle on the Same Night

Siblings from Central District Troops 3329 and 329 achieved the rank of Eagle Scout on May 19, 2022

Regan Huxtable, a graduating senior from Madison Highland Prep, and her younger brother Thomas, a sophomore, found themselves sitting for their Boards of Review on the same night.

"It just happened," Regan says when asked if it was planned. Regan's Eagle project consisted of building a mobile garden and sensory table for the Ryan House and installing pavers in their courtyard where the table sits. "I had to wait between constructing the table and installing the pavers to allow their facilities director to complete another project before reviewing and approving mine, but we got it done and it turned out beautiful," shared Regan. Regan's perseverance to see the project to the end reflects her developing leadership philosophy, cultivated by her involvement in the NYLT program. An NYLT Leadership Academy graduate, Regan is actively involved in NYLT programming for the Council.

Thomas' Eagle project included the removal of over a mile of barbed wire fencing from the Sonoran Desert in Vekol Valley, south of Maricopa. As cattle ranching has moved out of that area, BLM and AZ Game and Fish look to remove the fencing and enable the secure repopulation of the Sonoran Pronghorn sheep while providing for safer recreation in the area. His Eagle project was a "difficult experience, but the volunteers enjoyed it and the beneficiary was happy with the work that was done." Thomas is looking forward to his transfer to Franklin Police & Fire High School where he will enter the Law/Forensics track.

Regan says about their relationship in scouting, "it's like any sibling relationship, sometimes we argue with each other, but at the end of the day, he's my brother and we've always got each other's back. In scouting, it's a bit different, it becomes more like a colleague relationship." Thomas sees his older sister as a peer in scouting, describing her as "hardworking and determined while using humor to make scouting a fun experience."

Camp Raymond, April 30, 2022 - Sonoran Sunset Troops have a great time at Rt. 66 Shooting Camporee. The Rt.66 Shoot Camporee was hosted by the Ponderosa District / Troop 7033 and had four major events that included 20-gauge shotgun, .22 caliber rifle, archery and axe throwing. The Scouts could do the events in any order they chose but they had to do all four and the rifle competition twice. There were three troops from Buckeye, Troop 515 (Odyssey Preparatory Academy Elementary) and brother/sister Troop 448 and 3448 girls (Odyssey Preparatory Academy HS). There were two troops from Peoria, Troop 126 (Circle of Peace) and Troop 505 girls (American Legion Post #94). From Sun City, there was Troop 938 (Sun City Lodge #72 F&AM)

For the 22-gauge shotgun, it was trap shooting and the goal was to hit clay targets that were traveling away from the shooter. The targets were projected into the air at varying angles using an oscillating machine known as a "house" or bunker". Scouts shot 10 rounds.

At the .22 caliber rifle range, Scouts had two targets and had 5 shots per target each time they were at the rifle range. Each Scout participated twice in this event. Scores were based on the grouping of their shots. Scouts picked one score for their individual score and another score for their three-person team score.

In Archery, Scouts had two rounds with 10 arrows per round. Scouts were trying to achieve the highest score possible with the bulls-eye being the most points. After each round the staff would score their rounds.

The Axe throwing competition was hosted by Flag-TagAZ.com located in Flagstaff on Route 66. The axe throwing was very popular as evident by all the scouts visiting at the end of the day during open time. During the competition, a Scout was given 5 practice throws to try single hand and double hand throws. Then they had 10 throws to obtain the highest score possible aiming for the bulls-eye.
